Petitions for the "Voter Empowerment Act of 2016" may be on the street soon. DO NOT SIGN THE PETITIONS!

If this proposition were to pass:

- * It could destabilize the state pension fund and the state would become liable to make up the difference.
- * It would undermine teacher recruitment.
- * it could create 1,700 different plans (rather than STRS only) creating chaos if a teacher changed districts.
- * it could eliminate vested rights.
- * it would impact women the most.

Reporting a Death

Quite often I receive calls requesting information on contacting CalSTRS after the death of a member. My best advice is to look in your pink address booklet, page 18. There it tells you how and why to contact the Sacramento office. Not only do they need to know so that benefit payments can be stopped in a timely manner, but a death benefit check will be mailed to the survivor, or beneficiary. Call the toll-free number at 1 (800)228-5453. Apparently the other number has been disconnected. CalSTRS will provide further information on how to proceed with the claim once they are contacted.

Pedestrian Safety

The two circumstances in which pedestrians need to be especially careful are: crossing streets, and walking in parking lots—usually to get to or from your parked car. Many times our minds are on other things – what we are going to do at the store, what we just did, where we're going next, plans for tomorrow, talking on the cell phone, etc. Do you remember the popular song, "Did You Ever See a Dream Walking?" That's a good description of a distracted pedestrian.

We all know the dangers involved in crossing streets and what precautions we should take. The situation in parking lots can be more complicated. Usually cars park head-on into diagonal parking spaces in two rows, one to the left and one to the right. In that case you would be walking between two rows of parked cars. When these cars leave, they have to back up, and there is the danger.

The driver usually looks around before he gets in the car, and seeing no pedestrians or other cars looking for a parking space determines it is clear to go. He gets in the car, buckles up, starts the engine, shifts into reverse and starts backing up. The driver remembers that there was no traffic, but there was enough time for a pedestrian to enter the area while he was preparing to start. We all know that vision behind the car is restricted from the driver's position (obstructions, inadequate mirrors, dirty back window, etc.) so it is up to the pedestrian to stay alert. First look for a car with back-up lights on. Back-up lights are usually white/clear (not red or amber) located in the same area as brake lights and taillights, which are red. Back-up lights being on means that the engine is running, the transmission is in reverse and the car could start backing up at any time. If the car stops backing, stay clear, for as long as those lights are on, the car could start backing again. If the back-up lights are on and the stop lights are on, the driver is in reverse with his foot on the brake. This doesn't mean he can see you. If the stop lights go out, he could start moving. The pedestrian has the right-of-way but no protection. Remember this headstone in the cemetery:

*Here lies Jeff Strong
He was right, dead right
But he's just as dead
As if he'd been wrong.*

After the rocks had been labeled and catalogued, many volunteer hours of "sweat equity" were needed to construct the facing, as well as the fireplace itself.

Volunteer members also constructed shelves, glass cabinets and anything that was needed to make the room beautiful, functional, and relaxing. Committees were formed for accepting donations of furnishings, décor, serving ware and whatever would be desirable for a room that would be used for classes, social hours, and restful activities, as well as reading.

Today we are able to enjoy this lovely room and beautiful building because of the dreams, dedication and hard work of early members. They sacrificed in many ways to provide our association and community with an educational center that would be admired for its beauty and lofty purposes for years to come.

The room is named for David R. Metzler, association president from 1962-64. He was so influential in getting the idea of the center accepted and supported by teachers and the business and educational leaders of the city, county, and surrounding areas. He worked tirelessly and relentlessly along with the finance committees to secure funding, interest, and support for an area educational center, which became a reality in November of 1972, when dedication ceremonies were held, 10 years after his presidency.

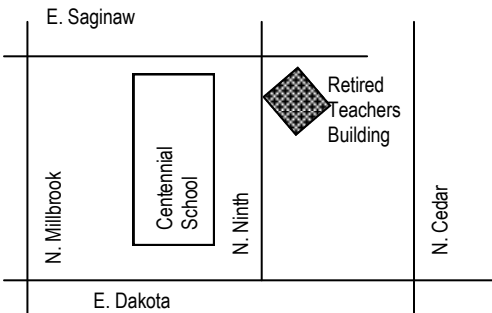
A focus of her remarks will be the pending threat to teachers' retirement – as well as threats to other public pensions. Wetzel says constitutionally guaranteed agreements may be threatened by outside influences forcing ballot initiatives. Legitimate PACs (Political Action Committees) likely face a critical demand for the finances needed to carry undistorted truths to the voting public.
